## 2008 Empire State Games- Public Service Opportunity

Hello Fellow Hams!

For some this is old news, for others it's new. The Empire State Games are coming back to Binghamton for the third time! **The opening ceremonies will be on Wednesday July 23rd and the games run from the 24th through Sunday the 27th.**

Why do you think the decision was made to come back to Binghamton for the third time? It can't be our weather or sunshine, but the facilities for the events, the people, and the COMMUNICATIONS we have provided in the past are all in our favor.

For those who have not been a part of the games before, it is like a small Olympics. The state is divided into four divisions (West, Central, East, and NYC/LI). The

divisions compete against each other in the various events.

The events begin each day around 8:00 AM and may continue to 10:00 or 11:00 PM, depending on the type of event. The main venue is Binghamton University, but venues in Binghamton, Endicott, Vestal, Chenango Bridge, West Windsor, Kirkwood, Conklin, Endwell, Owego, Cortland and Ithaca will also be in use.

Our involvement is to provide communications between the medical staff, trainers, officials, and the main command point. Past games have proven our ability to provide almost instant communications for emergencies, scoring, and other purposes. We need hams to help in 2008. If you can move and are not on life support, we have a job for you!

Most operations will be on 2-meters using HTs and Repeaters, "loaner" equipment will be available. In some cases specialized equipment will be provided to assure reliable communications. A Frequency/Communications Plan has been worked out so that locations in Broome and Tioga Counties will hear what is happening at the other locations.

Restricted mobility and similar needs can be met if you volunteer early enough. Likewise, early registration permits us to mesh your work and vacation schedules to our communications needs.

Please mark your calendar from July 24th through the 27th and give us a hand.

Hams like to tell of our good deeds and the help we provide. NOW IS A TIME FOR US TO COME FORWARD AND DO OUR PART. The games are a highly visible, community oriented event that can showcase the amateur radio service.

To allow time for the schedulers to coordinate your availability with our needs and to assemble the packets for each volunteer communicator, we need to receive your application before June 15th.

## FIOS Power Supply Problem

Anyone using Verizon's FIOS network to connect to the Internet, might want to see whether they have a power supply known to cause problems.

The most popular wireless router that Verizon provides each FIOS user is the model M1424WR. This router requires a 5VDC at 3A supply, which is provided by a small “wall wart” identified as part number ADS6818-1505-WDB.

Well, it turns out that these supplies have a high failure rate and a typical symptom is when you can't connect to the Internet, the LEDs on the router are flickering, and the green LED on the supply is flickering instead of glowing steadily. When this happened to me and I spoke to a Verizon technician he immediately knew what the problem was and shipped me a replacement supply.

Because of the high failure rate Verizon is now sending replacement power supplies to users of the M1424WR.

To tell if you have a new supply or an old supply, the old supply has an identifying label printed white on a black background. The new supply has black printing on a yellow background. Also, the old supply has the marking “Output: 5VDC 3A 15W” while the new supply adds “Rev. E” after the “15W.”

Apparently the early supply fails gracefully – it doesn't damage anything else – but it does take ~5 days to get a replacement from Verizon and you'll be off the air till then. So if you have an old supply, and haven't received a replacement, you might want to check with Verizon.

## Dayton Hamfest- in Sam's Words

Dayton! Anyone who has been involved with Ham Radio for some time has heard about the Dayton Hamvention. Hamvention is sometimes billed as the world's largest ham radio convention, if it isn't, it has to come close. This year there were 2500 spaces in the Flea Market and very few were empty. Inside there were 550 exhibitor booths, and again very few were empty! So many people attend (approximately 20,000) that the main parking area is ½ mile away at the site of an old mall. Buses run

continuously back and forth but we never waited more than a few minutes.

The Hamvention is a three day event held in May in the Hara Arena in Dayton Ohio. Gates open to the Flea Market at 8am, the inside exhibits open at 9am, and the convention closes at 6pm Friday, 5pm Saturday, and 1pm on Sunday. It sounds like a lot of time, but you can't possibly see everything in the Flea Market and the exhibits! There are a lot of other activities going on demonstrations, lectures, meetings, etc. There are also forums running almost continuously whenever the exhibits are open. These include popular topics such as Lightning Protection, Kit Building, The National Traffic System, Ham Radio and the Law, QRP, ATV, Contesting, and many more. The forums were a great place to sit down and rest for a while –your feet will get tired!

This year a ticket to Hamvention cost \$20 in advance and \$25 at the door. They have a website ([www.hamvention.org](http://www.hamvention.org)) where you can purchase tickets with a credit card. The parking buses cost \$3 a day or \$8 in advance for the weekend. You will need a hotel room or camping spot near Dayton, and food at the arena is a little expensive (about the same as our War Memorial.) We carpooled with four people to offset the price of gas (about the same in Ohio as New York.) It took us about 10 hours driving each way.

Why go to Hamvention? This year's theme was Amateur Radio + people = fellowship. One of the best things about hamvention is meeting and talking to people from all over who love ham radio just like you do. Everyone wants to talk about what they just bought at the flea market, or where you can see some exciting gear ( the Dstar booth!) new radios, old radios, etc. Everyone we met seemed to be in a good mood and excited to be there. I know we were!

Every major and minor manufacturer and seller of ham radio equipment is represented. The major radio manufacturers; ICOM, YAESU, ALINCO, KENWOOD, all have large booths in the main arena where they are displaying their radios and showcasing new products. There are lots of give-aways, hats, bumper stickers, charts, maps, buttons, flyers, catalogs, sample magazines; I came away with about 25 pounds of “stuff”. Many large resellers are present and many smaller manufactures too. The inside exhibits are spread through 7 or 8 rooms and areas. It can be confusing, but by Sunday everything is pretty familiar and you can find your way back to that one item you glimpsed on the first couple of passes. Once the excitement of seeing everything passes and the crowd thins out a little, you can get a close look at what interests you and get a chance to speak to the people manning the exhibits.

There are bargains everywhere – almost every booth has a “Hamvention Special” or a dozen!

The ARRL has a whole room setup with booths from every department and area of ham radio they are involved in; AMSAT, Youth Activities, Education services, volunteer examiners and more. They have a huge booth where they are selling every product they have; book, shirts, mugs, log books – anything you need to operate! My favorite was the video booth they had setup. You could sit and rest for a while and watch videos of DXpeditions.

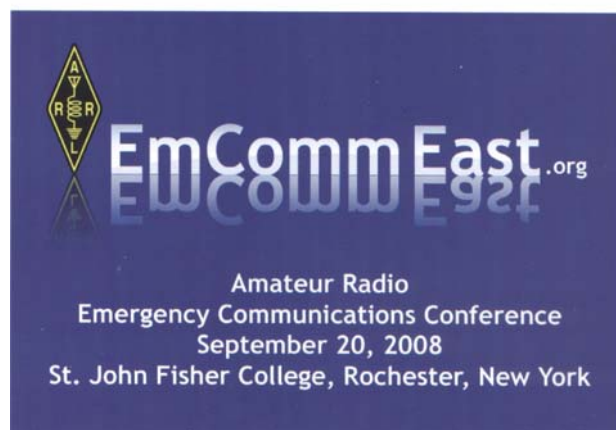
Prizes! What ham radio get-together is complete without prizes? Hamvention had many door prizes being drawn every hour though out the event. They had video monitors around the exhibits that would scroll the winning ticket numbers. Even with all the hams constantly checking their numbers some were drawn and not claimed. These were given away on Sunday along with a lot of major and minor prizes. The Exhibits and flea market are over at 1pm on Sunday (although the flea market started to thin out a lot on Sunday morning.) Everyone gathered in the main hall for the prize drawings. Number are drawn and announced, you then have a small window of time to sing out (3-4 seconds small!) or else they would draw another number. Everyone had a great time seeing radios, antennas, software, and other items given away. One of the most appreciated prizes was a parking spot right on site at the arena for next year’s Hamvention!



The flea market was spectacular! If you like hamfests with lots of “stuff” to look at you will love the flea market. There were surplus booths, military booths, computer/network gear booths, “Junk” booths, parts booths, kits booths, booths dedicated to certain manufactures, etc. Lots of “Etc.”! There were golf carts and mini trailers that would carry the heavy stuff for you and shipping booths if you didn’t want to carry you purchases home. If you couldn’t find what you were

looking for at the flea market then it was there and you missed it – or someone else bought it before you!

All in all I can heartily recommend the Dayton Hamvention. Where else can you talk to Bob Heil himself, get an autographed copy of his book, and try a half dozen of his products? Where else can you see the latest DSTAR equipment, talk to the manufacturer and the developers one on one? Where else do you have a chance at winning an IC746PRO3? Don’t take my word for it, go see Hamvention for yourself!
